Teacher Information Sheet 1st Grade: Vocalizations

Students will learn several bird songs (Acorn Woodpecker, House Finch, Allen's Hummingbird, Mourning Dove, California Quail). They will also learn why birds sing: to attract a mate, to establish territory, to make contact with the flock, to raise the alarm when predators come. Finally, students will learn how sound (pitch and volume over time) can be represented on the paper, looking at spectrograms.
