

2025 Pasadena Audubon Christmas Bird Count: Feeder Watcher Data Sheet

Hello Feeder Watcher! Thanks for volunteering to be a feeder watcher for the Pasadena Audubon Christmas Bird Count (CBC). Your efforts will help us get a more accurate census of the birds in our count circle on December 20th, 2025. The purpose of this sheet is to give you a few tips and hints on watching your feeders and yard, methods of watching, counting strategies and data return.

Two essential points of clarification: 1. Your feeder must be within the Pasadena CBC circle. You can use the following Christmas Bird Count Map to confirm this:

<https://gis.audubon.org/christmasbirdcount/> Type in your address in at the top of the page and then zoom out to check if it falls inside the count circle. 2. You are to count birds ONLY on December 20th, 2025 between 12:01am and 11:59pm! The purpose of the Christmas Bird Count is to record birds within a pre-defined 15-mile diameter count circle in a 24-hour period.

There are two ways to count 1) You can watch your feeders in a solid block - ideally starting in the morning or evening when feeders are most productive or 2) you can watch casually over the day.

The most important information that we MUST have is: 1) How long you watched for in total 2) The maximum number of an individual species that you had at one time. This means you aren't adding up and writing on the form the number of House Finches that you saw during the day but writing in the most that you could see at any one moment in time. 3) The number of people in your household counting.

Below I have created a form that will cover the most likely visitors to your yard. It may be that you have something less expected, so I have left room for you to write those species in. If something that you see during your count is rare for our area it may be that we need to contact you to clarify the identification.

Once you have completed you count and filled out your sheet please send it to Luke Tiller at Pasadena Audubon fieldtrips@pasadenaaudubon.org. A photo of the sheet emailed is probably simplest. Be sure to include your name, address and time spent watching. PAS need to submit data by mid-January, so procrastinating may result in your efforts not being included in the national census.
